This is to give you notice that unless the said gate is removed and the right of way put in condition for proper usage for Mr. Hazard and his friends and visitors that he will take steps to do away with all obstruction in his right of way and if, necessary, will break down said gate.

We trust you will give immediate orders to your superintendent on the grounds so that there will be no more interference with Mr. Hazard's right of access to his property across this right of way and that you will have the said road put in condition for comfortable travel.
