I have delayed answer to yours of May 21st until I had consulted with our attorneys, and have now to say that I have nothing further to add to the full and explicit letter which I wrote you covering this matter, on January 18th, to which I refer you, and I again desire to say that we are ready to accord to Mr. Hazard every courtesy in the way of personal privilege in crossing our grounds. They are open in the daytime and we should be glad to furnish him key to the gate, so that he can get in and out when the care-taker is not there. We shall go to any length to accommodate him, and then, if this is not satisfactory, the only way open to you is the one suggested in the letter to which I refer you.
