I have thought a thousand times about the work of the University and I am not yet willing to believe that the Epworth League is so dead to denominational pride and devotion to a good cause, that they will not respond to the appeal of the American University and put up the Epworth College. While I believe that it is good work to go and visit the Leagues, yet if it were possible to get enough advertisements to pay for a monthly issue of five hundred thousand copies of a small paper, and send these direct to the members of the League, I believe that the constant hammering each month at the same subject would surely bring the same results. I hope you will
